

S JERRY CRAFT

Jerry Craft is the *New York Times* bestselling author and illustrator of the graphic novels *New Kid* and *Class Act*. *New Kid* is the only book in history to win the John Newbery Medal for the most outstanding contribution to children's literature (2020), the Kirkus Prize for Young Readers' Literature (2019), and the Coretta Scott King Author Award for the most outstanding work by an African American writer (2020). Jerry was born in Harlem and grew up in the Washington Heights section of New York City.





TIFFANY D. JACKSON

Tiffany D. Jackson is the *New York Times* Bestselling, award-winning author of YA novels *Monday's Not Coming*, *Allegedly*, *Let Me Hear A Rhyme*, *Grown*, *White Smoke*, and co-author of *Blackout*. She received her bachelor of arts in film from HBCU Howard University, and has over a decade in TV/Film experience. She has been the Coretta Scott King – John Steptoe New Talent Award-winner and a nominee of the NAACP Image Award. Ms. Jackson is a Brooklyn native, currently residing in the borough she loves, and most often can be found multitasking.





MATT DE LA PENA

Matt de la Peña is the *New York Times* Bestselling, Newbery Medal-winning author of seven young adult novels (including *Mexican WhiteBoy*, *We Were Here*, and *Superman: Dawnbreaker*) and six picture books (including *Milo Imagines the World* and *Last Stop on Market Street*). In 2016 he was awarded the NCTE Intellectual Freedom Award. Matt received his MFA in creative writing from San Diego State University and his BA from the University of the Pacific where he attended school on a full basketball scholarship. In 2019 Matt was given an honorary doctorate from UOP. Matt currently lives in Southern California. He teaches creative writing and visits schools and colleges throughout the country.

In 2020, he became the only author, in the history of the award, to have won the Kirkus Prize twice for his twelfth release, the New York Times bestseller, *I Am* Every Good Thing. Derrick is a graduate of Jackson State University and was the first African-American male creative copywriter hired by greeting cards giant Hallmark Cards. He is a native of Kansas City, MO, but currently lives in Charlotte, North Carolina, with his enchanting wife, Dr. Tinka Barnes, and their four sons, the Mighty Barnes Brothers.







Steven L. Layne has written more than 25 books in a wide range of genres. 






BLUE BALLIETT








LYNNE DORFMAN



CONALYN MILLER



She talks about the inspiration for *Starfish*, a book she needed as a child – that all children need. A book that's a mirror for fat children and a window for nonfat children. She discusses why she chose to write *Starfish* in verse, why bullying is never okay, and how we can all be upstanders in our own lives.



April 5, 2023 ~ Beverley Holden Johns The Impact of Anxiety on Children's Literacy: Practical Strategies That Support Children



Anxiety disorders are recognized as the most prevalent mental health disorder among children and adolescents. Prior to the pandemic, twenty five percent of children between the ages of 13-18 had an anxiety disorder. Now there are estimates that this percentage may have doubled. Anxiety can negatively affect a child's academic success in the area of literacy. Teachers are often the first to notice signs. This session provides educators a basic understanding of the characteristics of anxiety in its various forms, guiding principles regarding positive interventions, and a whole array of strategies to support students with anxiety



December 7, 2022 ~ Candace Fleming Writing Great Nonfiction With Kids



Can kids write engaging nonfiction? Absolutely! In this fast-paced presentation, award-winning author Candace Fleming will share her secrets for creating fascinating nonfiction.
