

IRC Conference is an Open Forum

The IRC Conference serves as an open forum and exchange of ideas and opinions. Opinions that are expressed by featured speakers, program presenters, and participants do not reflect endorsements by the Illinois Reading Council.

Conference Sessions

All conference sessions will be held in the Bank of Springfield Center, President Abraham Lincoln Hotel, and Wyndham Hotel.

Pre-Registration & Registration

Pre-registered conferees may obtain their registration packets at the Registration Desk in the Exhibit Hall at the Bank of Springfield Center. On-site registration is also available. Hotel reservations and meal function tickets should be secured prior to arrival in Springfield. Registration Hours: Wednesday, March 13-5:00-9:00 PM Thursday, March 14-7:00 AM -2:00 PM Friday, March 15-7:00 AM -2:00 PM.

ISBE PD Clock Hours

IRC is an approved ISBE Professional Development Provider. Registered conference attendees can earn up to one clock hour for each session attended. Registered presenters can also earn up to eight clock hours for presenting a session. At the end of the conference, plan to submit your clock hours for the sessions that you attended and/or presented at the conference via an online form. The ISBE Evidence of Participation will be sent to you about two weeks after the conference.

• Admission to Meetings

Paid conferees receive a badge with their registration packet. Badges are required at all times and for all conference functions. Seating will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Pre-purchased tickets are required for all meal functions.



Welcome to the 55th Annual Illinois Reading Council Conference





Dear Conference Attendees,

On behalf of the Illinois Reading Council Executive Committee, the IRC staff, the Conference Committee members, and you, the IRC members, welcome to the 55th Annual Illinois Reading Council Conference — Pillars of Literacy: Skills, Strategies, Joy, & Magic.

The Pillars of Literacy are at the core of every effective reading instruction program. They include Phonemic Awareness, Phonics, Fluency, Vocabulary and Comprehension. Skills are needed for decoding (phonics, pre-fixes, suffixes, root words, morphology, etc.). Key strategies (predicting, asking questions, summarizing, visualizing, making inferences, activating prior knowledge, etc.) are used to aid in understanding what we read.

In terms of Joy and Magic, we recall Louise Rosenblatt's reader response theory that stresses the importance of the reader making meaning from the text (1988). This is where the joy comes in. When we think about the partnering of skills — code deciphering — together with our experiences, we are able to read for the purpose of enjoyment or for learning. The result of this combination is pure magic!

The national educational landscape now includes the Science of Reading, as many school districts are adopting this form of instruction. These concepts have been around for many years and refer to a body of research from the fields of education, cognitive psychology, developmental psychology, and neuroscience. At this year's conference, we added a new strand for all of the sessions on this topic, offering a range of perspectives. Other strands include: administration, literacy coaching, early career, English Language Learners, Equity and Diversity, Librarians, Reluctant Readers, Social Emotional Learning, STEAM, Technology and Writing.

This conference is packed with over 200 sessions to cover your needs. Don't forget to visit our exhibitors and drop by the membership booth. Make plans to see the Illinois Reads Authors as well as "Hear the Authors Read" which is our late-night autograph session on Thursday!

As you move through these exciting conference days, you will also notice hundreds of volunteers who donate their time taking tickets at a meal function, registering attendees, putting up signs, guiding people to the right session room, or helping out in any way. Be sure to thank them! Special thanks to Carrie Sheridan, our Executive Director. She is the one who brings this all together for us each year.







AUTOGRAPH SCHEDULE

Bank of Springfield Center Exhibit Hall

Prior to each autographing session, please purchase the books you wish to be autographed. Books are available at each author's publisher's booth or Anderson's Bookshops booths in the exhibit area. Most authors will be signing in the designated area located at the back of the exhibit hall. A separate line will be formed for each author.

Due to the number of authors and scheduling, it will not be possible for books to be left for later autographing. Some authors will sign only their name and do no personalizing.

Each author will sign a maximum of three books per person when that person is in the author's line. If an individual would like to have more than three books signed by an author, there are two options:

- a. Bring purchased books to Authors Signing Booth and ask for bookplates. (There are limited quantities.)
- b. Go to the end of the line and wait to have three more books signed by the author. The author may or may not have time to sign additional books because authors agree to sign for specific time periods.

IRC Awards & Grants

Are you interested in learning how to nominate individuals from your area for IRC awards or how to benefit from grant money that is available each year for various educational activities? To find out more about these IRC Awards and Grants, please visit www.illinoisreadingcouncil.org.

Barack Obama Library Award. This award is a classroom library, valued at over \$1000, which was created in 2006 through a generous gift to the IRC from (then) Senator Obama. This collection is comprised of carefully selected literature that is "culturally relevant" for African-American readers and targets students in the middle-school (5th-8th) grade range. The award will go to a teacher in a predetermined IRC Region. Each year, the region will be announced on the IRC Website. Nominations are due by November 1st.

Family Literacy Award. This award recognizes an IRC member who promotes and supports parent involvement in children's reading. Proposals should be postmarked by November 1st.

Gene Cramer ICARE for Reading Award. The Illinois Council for Affective Reading Education recognizes an educator who has performed in an outstanding manner to show concern for the affective domain and who has performed lifelong reading habits among students. The Nomination Form is due by November 1st.

Hall of Fame Award. The IRC has designed the Hall of Fame to recognize significant contributions to reading or reading education. The award will be given at the annual conference. The immediate Past President shall receive the nomination forms and final determination will be made by the Executive Committee no later than 60 days prior to the Annual Meeting. Deadline: All Nomination Forms must be received by November 1st.

International Grant. The International Committee of the Illinois Reading Council has created a grant to promote literacy projects internationally. The maximum amount per grant is \$1,000. The application deadline is May 1st.

IRC Service Award. The IRC will present the IRC Service Award (formerly known as the Certificate of Recognition) at the annual statewide conference. Certificates are awarded to the most deserving individuals who meet the criteria listed. Deadline: All Nomination Forms must be received by November 1st.

Jerry Johns Reading Educator of the Year Award. This award recognizes outstanding teachers who make contributions in promoting literacy among students, colleagues, and school communities. Application Form, letters of recommendation, and your philosophy statement are due by November 1st.

Literacy Support Grant. The Illinois Reading Council will award financial grants to local and special interest councils and individual council members for the purpose of promoting literacy development in the school and community, and/or providing professional development opportunities related to the improvement of reading and writing instruction. Application deadline will be May 1st.

Prairie State Award for Excellence in Writing for Children. This award recognizes an Illinois Children's Young Adult Author whose body of work demonstrates excellence, engenders a love of literature, and embraces an important part of the mission of the Illinois Reading Council—to promote lifelong literacy. All Nomination Packets must be postmarked by June 15th.

Static Stick Decal Design Contest. Students in grades 4, 5, or 6 are encouraged to create an original design promoting reading. The winning design is printed on static stick decals. Entries must be postmarked no later than January 15th.

Success in the Mountains: How Appalachian Literacy Initiative Increases Student Reading Proficiency – And You Can, Too

In 2018, in response to the very high child poverty rate where she lives and the correlation between poverty and reading level, Kim and a friend founded a nonprofit called Appalachian Literacy Initiative. In their sixth year they will give out over 50,000 books to low-income Appalachian students--and they've seen a 10% increase in reading proficiency for a cost of less than \$35 per student. 





Currently, schools across the United States are looking for ways to improve second language (L2) writing. In their quest to improve their writing skills, they are drawing on a variety of teaching strategies to be successful since research suggests that their use is the key to improving L2 writing. Second language learners L2 writing test scores are not reaching the required standard to be considered proficient in the L2. Tests that evaluate students' L2 writing evidently reflect that something is not right with students' L2 writing instruction. The purpose of this study was to explore elementary language teachers' understanding of writing strategies with second language learners (SLL). Using a qualitative method, specifically a phenomenological approach, semi structured interviews with second language elementary level teachers revealed that there is a need for more support in the availability of uniform resources to instruct second language writing. The findings highlighted effective strategies but also the need for more consistent and comprehensive support for language teachers in the area of second language writing instruction, including the development of more specialized curriculums and resources that are specifically designed for this purpose.





Exhibit Hall on First Floor


