


I learned so much from reading this riveting YA nonfiction about an event that erupted in our country 30 years ago. Tensions were high in Los Angeles County in April, 1992, after members of the Black and Koreatown communities failed to receive justice for those who had been wrongfully attacked. Riots broke out and gained momentum with a lack of police presence. Economic hardship and poverty spurred it on. Prosecutor Terri White in the Rodney King case is just one of the many heroes I recognized in this story. People from varying cultures helping each other in life and death situations. Both wanted justice. Good and bad can be found in all human relationships. Systemic challenges continue today. American history of redlining, food deserts, unequal penalties for crimes in different communities, lopsided juries are just some of what leads to racial tensions today. Author Yoo used loads of interviews, direct quotes, news reports and photographs to tell the

story. She movingly threaded the stories together to help me understand what was happening in our country. Gave great historical context.




IRC Awards Grants


Family Literacy Bookshelf By Barb Ashton

The store shelves and advertisements remind us that a new school year is about to start. While August has no major holidays to celebrate, it is Family Fun Month and National Picnic Month. So grab your favorite summer beverage, relax, and enjoy the warmth and beauty of summer.



We've all seen on TV and in the newspapers the ongoing struggle in the Middle East between Palestine and Israel, especially after the attack on October 7th. The book *Ida in the Middle* by Nora Lester Murad provides a nice introduction to the ongoing struggles of the Palestinian people. This is the story of 13-year-old Palestinian-American Ida and her two sisters who are daughters of immigrant parents. Ida is bullied and not accepted by her classmates. Ida and her classmates are given a required assignment called "The Passion Project" which has to be presented in front of the entire school. While at home, with the deadline for the final project drawing near, Ida looks for a snack and comes across a jar of olives from her aunt who lives in her family's village near Jerusalem. Ida eats one olive and is suddenly transported to Palestine. While she's there Ida sees the beauty of the village but also experiences the turmoil and violence within Palestine. As a result of this experience, Ida gains


the courage and ability to speak before the all-school assembly, discovers her own identity, resolves her quest for her passions, and how she'll be able to assimilate and find her place in the world. *Ida in the Middle* is a book that shows the Palestinian side of the war and also encourages discussion about human rights, family, and social justice. The author has included a glossary of Arabic terminology to help clarify the meaning of the words throughout the story. This year marks the 60th anniversary of the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 which paved the way for the passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965. To learn about the history of voting rights in America read *Equality's Call: The Story of Voting Rights in America* by Deborah Diesen. The story begins with a classroom of students studying about voting rights. As the page turns the students/reader go back in time to the founders and their idea of representation and people voting. Only white men of property or means were allowed to vote and mostly on issues that concerned them. There were also many people who weren't allowed to vote due to their gender, race, or economic status. As the story continues

through rhyming verse and as the pages are turned, a timeline forms. The reader meets historical figures and activists who worked to bring about changes to voter rights. The refrain "But we heardEquality's call: A right isn't right Till it's granted to all" is repeated throughout the book and the crowd of diverse people increases as they become part of the march for voter rights. The struggle for voting rights still continues today and ends with the question "How will you answer equality's call?" *Equality's Call* is a great read-aloud and the illustrations by Magdalena Mora enhance the written text. The back of the book contains two pages of the 59 activists from the beginning to present time who spoke up for the right to vote. There are also two pages that list the amendments to the Constitution and other laws that protect and extend voting

rights to all Americans. *Equality's Call* is a timely book as we head into the upcoming election of 2024. There is also a great curriculum guide, teacher's guide and a parents' guide that can be downloaded from the author's website and the Anti Defamation League.



Have you ever heard about a parrotfish and what it can do? The book *Parrotfish Has a Superpower* by Jill Esbaum is a delightful and cute read that blends fact and fiction. This is about a marine animal that lives in warm tropical water, has a unique way of hiding from predators, has 1,000 teeth that resemble a beak, and has even more teeth in his throat. He also likes to eat algae and polyps but can do something no other fish can do. As parrotfish swims about he meets a hammerhead shark and strikes up a conversation, wanting to tell his story. However, there is a problem – Hammerhead Shark keeps interrupting by telling about himself. Annoyed by Hammerhead, Parrotfish points to a sandy beach and tells Hammerhead "Guess who made that beach?" "Me" exclaims Parrotfish. Hammerhead is skeptical. Sensing this, Parrotfish

proceeds to demonstrate his superpower. To discover what Parrotfish's superpower is, you'll need to read the book *Parrotfish Has a Superpower*. The illustrations by Bob Shea are vibrant and colorful. The color coded speech bubbles let the reader know who is speaking, along with expressive emotions of the character that all contribute to enhance the story of Parrotfish. The back of the book provides a True and False quiz about parrotfish with the answers giving additional information about this unusual marine animal.
