






Mother's Day is fast approaching. A delightful and humorous book to read is *How to Raise a Mom* by Jean Reagan. This is a story of a brother and sister who take the reader into a reversal of roles with their mother for a day. Instead of mom waking the kids in the morning, they (the children) wake her. As the day continues the children run errands, wait in line at the grocery store, clean up after dinner, advise on eating vegetables, and various other situations. The clever and creative illustrations also add to the humor of the story. While *How to Raise a Mom* is an easy read, it is also a reminder to children of how important and wonderful moms are. This book would make a nice gift for Mother's Day.



Do you like to play video games? Did you ever wonder how they were invented and became part of our everyday life? Read <u>Blips</u> On A Screen: How Ralph Baer Invented TV Video Gaming and Launched a Worldwide Obsession by Kate Hannigan. This is the story of Ralph (Rudolf) Baer, who, as a teenager, fled from Germany to America after Hitler and the Nazis came to power. He was fascinated by the inner workings of the radio and what we now call electronics. Using his knowledge and talent for electronics, Ralph worked as a radio operator during World War II. After the war Ralph began a career in the new industry of television design, manufacturing, and repairs. He wanted to make TV more enjoyable, interactive, and fun. So over the next few years, during his free time, Ralph tinkered and tested various versions of a game box, a protype of a video game. It took several more years to fine-tune and fully develop his invention.

Magnavox took a chance on Ralph's video game and it became an instant success with large sales and thus began the video game craze. The cartoon-like illustrations add fun and capture Baer's life as an inventor and "Father of Video Games." *Blips On A Screen* is the fascinating story of Ralph Baer but it's also a story about overcoming challenges, self-motivation, hard work, and the reality of a dream come true. The back of the book contains more information about Ralph Baer's life, photographs, a detailed timeline, and additional resources for further reading. This book can be enjoyed by students of all ages.



Each May on Memorial Day, we honor those who paid the ultimate price. It is also the time when veterans hop on their motorcycles for the Ride for Freedom to Washington D.C. To learn about this event read *Rolling Thunder* by Kate Messner. The story is told in couplets. A grandpa and his grandson are headed to Washington D.C. to honor American veterans and those who lost their lives. The ride is also a reminder that there are still soldiers who are MIA (Missing in Action) and POWs (Prisoners of War), with the hope of bringing them home someday. While riding through the streets of Washington D.C. and passing by iconic buildings the riders end up at the Vietnam Memorial, The Wall, which lists the names of all service members who fought and died in Vietnam. Grandpa

rides "for his friends Joe and Tom who lost their lives in Vietnam." His grandson rides "for Uncle Zack who's flying airplanes far away." At The Wall they search for the names of friends and loved ones. The grandson makes a charcoal rubbing of the names. There are also "speeches and memory sharing by different vets." Before grandpa and his grandson leave, they place a flower, kneel and offer prayers. As the day draws to a close the grandson understands the experience

and realizes the significance of the day. Through the use of "bright oranges, warm reddish-browns, khaki, and olive green," the illustrations "reflect the mood and feelings" of the characters. *Rolling Thunder* is a great read to share with your students and parents on the importance of freedom, our military men and women, and being an American. This is a book that belongs in all libraries.
